





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## METHODOLOGY

An internship module: program is two way learning process which involves use of different methods of learning where by farmers learn from students and also students learn from farmers and how office work is operated daily basis It involves the following methods of learning.

### 1 .Discussion

This method involves bringing ideas together or interactions between the farmers and intern students before implementations of activities also guidance by the supervisor who handling that project.

### 2. Method demonstrations.

In this method basically the farmers are showed how to do something, In the method demonstration the farmer is showed step by step, for example, we showed the farmer how to plant seeds in lines using the drill method of planting, how to do hardening off, thinning ,timely weeding in the nursery bed and others.

### 3. Result demonstration.

The main purpose of a result demonstration is to show local farmers that in particular recommendation is practice able under local conditions for example, comparing different methods of mankind a seed bed(raised and ridges) to increase productivity. Here, we field marked two different seedbeds of 10m by 10m where by one was raised and one was in ridges in which we recommended the farmer to use the one with ridges in order to increase production (yields) of onion plants where by the one with ridges is easy for the plant to establish roots, absorb nutrients from the manure laid in between ridges, control soil erosion and others.

On the side of the animal, we showed the farmer how to identify ecto parasites, training of oxen, deworming and vaccination of poultry like ticks and their control.

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## ABSTRACT.

This report contains and describes the activities implemented, skills and qualifications gained, challenges faced during the industrial training, conclusion of the report and recommendations derived from the challenges faced at DADO organization, Kaabong and karenga District. The objective of this industrial training is to make students benefit from the skills and knowledge gained from the fields, apply the knowledge they get from the classroom in the field and build confidence in the students. During internship I was attached to the field officer of DINU project as field supervisor (Auma Goudoline). This was followed by orientation where I was first introduced to the all the staffs of Dynamic Agro-pastoralist Development Organization (DADO) in all capacities and later I implemented the activities such as; vaccinations of poultries and transplanting of seedling to seed beds Training of farmers on animal management, deworming of goats, thinning of crop, pruning of bananas plants, watering of crops, weeding of nursery bed. These activities has made me to gain a lot of skills and knowledge like; Deworming of goats and cattle, skills in general management of animals, communication skills and confidence in training farmers on animal and crop management, During internship, I also face some challenges like; poor mobilization of the farmer, lack of veterinary drugs and tillage equipment, crop and pesticide for spraying crops at the community we were to carry out activities, limited transport means for field work in the organization since all staffs were located to their motorcycle for the duties and poor turn up of the farmers to the training. In conclusion all the activities were implemented and industrial training was carried out successfully. I was able to gain a lot from Industrial training (IT). I was in position of getting practical skills and knowledge in line with my career and relating with people in the field. The technical advice that I provided addressed farmers' problem and needs. Much as all were successfully done, there were also some little challenges which hindered the smooth running of the activities making me recommend that proper mobilization of farmers must improve for the training programs to solve problems of poor turn up during such activities, DADO organization should also increase the number of motorcycles to solve transport problems and more equipment and veterinary drugs to be installed so that animals are treated and vaccinated in time and tillage equipment like hoes, seeds, fertilizers and pesticides for spraying crops so they improve in crop department too.
